What would life be if not for our shadow sides? *We* might not readily admit our own less-than-holy thoughts, but we do enjoy it when talented authors give us a peek. **Richard Bausch**, in "The Lineaments of Gratified Desire," is particularly skillful at this. **Nicole Cullen** ("Long Tom Lookout"), **Emma Duffy-Comparone** ("Plagiarism"), and **Patrick de Witt** ("The Picketer") add their wonderful offerings to the mix.

And to balance any bruised pride, we offer "Guided by Voices" by **Robert S. Brunk**. His personal musical journey of shape-note singing has three added audio selections to soothe the soul. It is truly an otherworldly experience.
