The first woman and first African American was sworn in as the fourteenth Librarian of Congress on September 14, 2016, by the Chief Justice of the United States, John G. Roberts, Jr. **Carla D. Now, as the head of the largest library in the world, Dr. Hayden is committed to making knowledge and information available to all.
